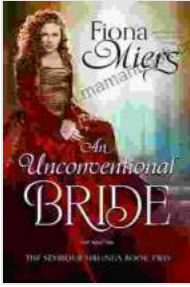

"I wanted my wedding to be a reflection of who I am," Mary says. "I'm not a traditional bride, and I didn't want a traditional wedding."

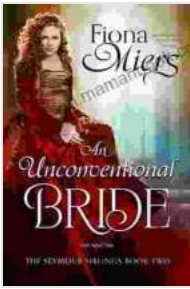

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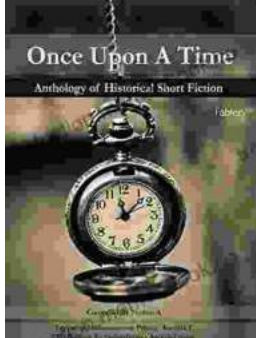
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
